Welcome !

In addition to the normal distribution to all residents of the parish this edition of the parish newsletter is also being delivered to residents who live on the west side of Moor Road. The council appreciate that whilst not living within the electoral boundary many of you contribute greatly to the life of the village and it's events and hope you may find the contents to be of interest, we would welcome your comments. Recent changes to the electoral parish boundary have been made along the A60 route and the possibility of further changes in future cannot be ruled out, especially with housing development still in the news.

Moor Pond Wood

Another successful meeting of "The Friends of Moor Pond Wood" was held on 6th April, when Terry Birch and Michael Owen from "The Friends of Brierley Forest Park" gave a talk on the forming and running of a "Friends" group. This was followed by an excellent presentation by Stephen Walker on the history of the site.

48 people were in attendance, a number that once again surprised our visitors, refreshments were served and a raffle with excellent prizes was held.

On 21st April Paddy Tipping MP came along to the village to see how the project was progressing and watch the Hucknall 1803 Air Training Corps Cadets installing a dipping platform they had constructed.

The Environment agency was also undertaking the first works in eradicating the invasive weed in the pond.

On Saturday 28th April a workday was held which saw the installation of the first disabled gate and access into the wood, although the ramp is still to be completed. Work also commenced on clearing the undergrowth and repairing the fencing around the area next to Grange Cottages. Some of the ATC Cadets are working on the project as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme and are to be congratulated on their efforts.

Next "Friends" meeting is on Friday 18th May in the Village Hall .



NEW FOOTPATHS

The new footpaths along the eastern side of Walter's Hill were officially opened by Paddy Tipping M P on Saturday, 21st April. These are the first new public rights of way to be opened in the parish for over 130 years and mean that pedestrians can avoid having to dodge traffic along Blidworth Waye. Notts. County Council have provided funds totalling £7,000 to enable these paths, and the verge improvements in-between, to be built. Many thanks to all the volunteers who helped us to clear the route and carry out construction work. By the time you read this, the woodland bluebells will be in flower so why not try out this new path?

The Parish Paths Partnership Committee have drawn up a Public Paths Strategy which outlines how they would like to see the footpath network extended over the next fifteen years. A copy of the Strategy is available on the web site at www.papplewick.org/local/pathinfo.htm.

Please let us have your views.

In an effort to prevent the spread of foot and mouth disease, all footpaths were closed in the parish on 3rd March. Following consultations with the County Council and local farmers, it was decided to re-open the paths on Walter's Hill and along Hall Lane towards Newstead Abbey, which can now be used as usual.

The local farmers have expressed their thanks to members of the public who have supported them by keeping away from restricted areas during the crisis.

However, the 'Moors' path between Moor Road and Mansfield Road, together with the path to Linby over the Meadows, will remain closed until further notice. Please continue to respect these closures.

Moor Road

At the Annual Parish Assembly a suggestion was made that the Council pursue a scheme of improvement works to the verges along Moor Road opposite Moor Pond wood. The work on Linby Lane has certainly been successful although the lay-by still has to be completed, however an assurance has been given that this work will be done.
