The Parish Council has had fruitful discussions with Gedling Borough Council and two highway projects should now be completed over the next few months.

LINBY LANE

The refurbishment of Linby Lane saw traffic calming measures introduced, new entrances to drives and posts installed to protect grassed areas. There has been some misuse with posts being damaged and removed and parking on the grassed areas. This has caused difficulty in getting the appropriate agencies to complete the final phase, the provision of lay-bys on the opposite side of the road. However this will now go ahead, (subject to a County Council safety audit) which should improve the look of this area. On the subject of parking, please try to avoid parking on pavements any where in the village, this causes obstructions to the many walkers who visit the village, particularly visually handicapped and children.

MANSFIELD ROAD

New signs were installed approx 18 months ago. The road signposts were altered to show Papplewick Village rather than just Papplewick and street signs showing Mansfield Road Papplewick were installed. The final part of the scheme will be provision of two

PAPPLEWICK signs on the A60 to signify entry to the village. One will be just past Seven Mile Inn going north and the other for south bound traffic will be at the start of the houses at Devils Elbow just past the quarry.

In the last Newsletter we mentioned planting bulbs bought with the £50 Best Kept Village prize. This has now been done on Mansfield Road, Moor Road and the Linby Lane lay-by. Thanks to Maureen & Tim Barker and Rowena & Gordon Huggett for carrying out the planting.

Thanks also to Garry Longdon for cutting the hedge on Church Lane.

A new timber fence is to be provided between the Playing Field and Village Hall car park. Please be careful if taking youngsters to the area while the works are in progress. The gate removed by vandalism is also to be replaced.



MOOR POND WOOD PROJECT

Grange Cottage Wood. The Friends of Moor Pond Wood and the Parish Council plan to improve this area by filling in the huge pits dug by "bottle diggers" and to create a wildflower meadow in the centre.

The scheme is intended to create an important local amenity and a disabled access and pathway are included in the plan. To achieve this an application has to be made to Nottinghamshire County Council for permission to import topsoil. This will involve lorries bringing soil to site and an access will need to be created on Moor Road.

We are hoping work will be undertaken shortly so the grass and wildflower seeds can be planted this spring.

In the main part of Papplewick Dam Wood a great amount of timber management has taken place. The work has been completed by The Leen Valley Conservation Volunteers working with Lee Scudder of Notts C C. On Linby Lane a new fence has been installed in the Lay-by.

Moor Pond Wood has also seen a lot of activity recently with hedge laying. After a training session on site a few weeks ago, several people had a go and between us we managed to "lay " the length along the path from Moor Road to the wooden bridge. This work was completed last weekend by "binding in" with Willow saplings. Interestingly different styles are used in each county to finish off the tops of laid hedges. Lee, an expert, says our work was done Nottinghamshire style, whether this is a compliment we're still debating but the results are certainly worth a look.

At the same time the opportunity was taken to remove unwanted fencing, barbed wire and rubbish at various places, making the whole area more presentable. Next friends meeting is on Friday February 22nd.



With this edition of the Newsletter, you should have received a questionnaire asking for numbers of people likely to attend a resident's party on Monday 3rd June. Concessionary Travel Scheme for Elderly & Disabled Persons in Nottinghamshire.

The Nottinghamshire Concessionary travel scheme is for Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons resident in Nottinghamshire. It is jointly financed by the County and District Councils. Travel permits provided under this scheme can be used on buses and trains throughout the County with very few restrictions. The permits initially are issued free of charge but you may need to provide a recent passport size photograph of your-self. RECYCLING your household waste

Gedling Council's Recycling program and ask that all residents make use of the facilities available, for example the kerbside collection system. As most people are aware, there is a waste paper and cardboard collection on a fortnightly basis.

In addition it is now possible to have glass and cans collected. A different crew collects them on the same days as the paper. The next dates for collections are February 21st, March 7th and March 21st.

There are also recycling points for cans & glass on the car parks of The Griffins Head and The Horse & Groom. At Linby they also accept plastic & paper.

LOCAL HISTORY WEEK


May 4th - 12th
