PROUD TO SERVE The Council have been concerned to hear of incidents of anti-social behaviour on the playing field. It is important that we work together to keep the facilities safe and usable. It is worth remembering that CCTV operates on the field. If you have any concerns about anti-social behaviour (but the circumstances are not an emergency situation) or to report a crime that has already happened, you should use the non-emergency number 101.

Notts Police - Fire and Rescue and East Ambulance Service have collaborated in creating the Pegasus data base helping individuals who have a disability, illness or vulnerability receive a swifter and effective service.

Registering with Pegasus means emergency services can access details guickly, without having to ask for your name, address and phone number so you can immediately discuss why you are contacting a particular emergency service.

This service is not for everyone - Pegasus is primarily for individuals who have a disability, illness or vulnerability.

Off road bikes, and illegally driven motorcycles are an increasing problem in country areas. You may wish to report : Details of the rider and distinguishing marks, the location and time you witnessed the event, Description (and registration) of vehicles transporting, loading or off loading the bikes.

If you see anything you are encouraged to contact the Police on the 101 number.

The Defibrillator

There is a Defibrillator available at the Village Hall.

The machine is fully automatic with a simple two-step process that gives the first person to respond to a cardiac arrest the confidence they need to help save a life. A responder only needs to turn on the device and apply the electrode pads to the victim. The fully automatic nature of the machine is designed to deliver a shock only if it determines that a heart needs it. No one even needs to press a 'shock' button.

The defibrillator is located in the Village Hall porch, on the right hand side, in a bright yellow container. It is available for use by any member of the community. It can only be accessed and used after obtaining a code from EMAS when dialling 999.

Council News

Since the last newsletter was circulated in the Summer, the Council has agreed to proceed with the neighbourhood plan. More details on the next page.

Councillors are considering how the village can be brightened up for the Christmas period. Anyone who is interested in helping out, please get in touch with the Clerk.

The Council participate in the shared Lengthsman Scheme, enabling it to commission a handyman to undertake small maintenance jobs around the Parish - for the benefit of the whole community. Most recently weed-killing has been carried out on paths and kerbs, Litter picking has been undertaken and Church Lane has been strimmed to make it more usable. Let us know if there are tasks that need attention in the area around where you live.

At the last meeting, concern was expressed about the condition of the pavement, and absence of dropped kerbs along Blidworth Waye. The County Council have agreed to investigate. We agreed to fund installation of a 'dropped kerb' on Moor Road to improve access to the pavement on the east side of the road for residents and visitors who have limited mobility. This was proposed to the County Council, but they were unwilling to support it. The Parish Council agreed to carry out this work because they feel that it has community benefit.

You will have noticed that the County Council has been changing the lighting on Linby Lane and Forest Lane. They have declined the request from the Parish Council to extend the lights to the edge of the 30MPH zone at Castle Mill.

At the meeting in September, the Parish Council confirmed its intention to work towards producing a Neighbourhood Plan. Grant Aid will be available to offset the costs.

Following the consultation in the Spring, Gedling Borough Council has agreed that the Parish Council will be allowed to produce a plan covering the whole of Papplewick Parish. We had hoped to reflect the views of residents of Ashfield along Moor Road, but the consultation revealed that there was not enough support for this idea. The plan will therefore only be directly relevant to Gedling Borough residents.

A Neighbourhood Plan does not replace or challenge the Local Plans produced by Gedling, but adds local opinion about how they should be interpreted. The process has begun with our public meetings that gathered a survey of opinions. The work will have to follow strict guidelines.

Development of the plan will be managed by a small committee of Councillors and residents. Once proposals are produced there will be a formal consultation of residents. Before the final plan can be adopted a local referendum will be required.

Papplewick, Queen Elizabeth playing field

The Council has been exploring the alternatives for the future development and management of the playing field. One suggestion is that we develop a safe informal play area in the section between the grassed area and Moor Pond Wood.

The Council has agreed to arrange for a tree survey to identify any forestry work that needs to be carried out.

Neighbourhood Plan progress

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At the Parish Council meeting in September, Councillors agreed to work alongside Linby Parish Council to commission a Traffic Consultant to examine and report on the options for traffic management in the parishes. This will be a valuable preparation for developing our neighbourhood plans.

Councillors from both parishes will share the burden of this important part of the process. Traffic issues and traffic management emerged as major issues of

concern at the residents meetings which were held in the spring. The Parish Councils are hoping that an independent assessment of the needs and possible solutions will provide evidence to inform discussion. In time, we hope that the traffic analysis will be the basis of making a lasting improvement to a situation that affects most of us.

Moor Pond Woods Project

The latest archaeological investigation near Papplewick Lane has revealed valuable clues to how the water crossed Papplewick Lane on its way to the mill. The conservation of Grange Cottages Sluice is close to completion and the site is being re-landscaped. In Grange Cottages Wood, the paths

are nearing completion. The group are now working to provide interpretation that will be installed over the coming months. This project is being funded by a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Over the next few weeks, work will start on building ramped access to Papplewick Dam from the layby. This will benefit all users, but particularly those with pushchairs or limited mobility.
