

Defibrillators

There are Defibrillators available at the Village Hall 24 hours a day, and one at the Pumping Station during Opening Hours. A defibrillator has been installed at the Cricket Club available to the public 24 hours each day. The defibrillator located in the Village Hall is on the right hand side of the porch, in a bright yellow container.



The machines are available for use by any member of the public. They can only be used after obtaining a code by dialling 999. The code you receive unlocks the key safe at the side of the yellow box. Please replace the key after use.

The machines are fully automatic with a simple two-step process that gives the first person to respond to a cardiac arrest the confidence they need to help save a life. A responder only needs to turn on the device and apply the electrode pads to the victim. The fully automatic nature of the machine is designed to deliver a shock only if it determines that a heart needs it. No one even needs to press a 'shock' button.

Your seven parish councillors are all local residents who work on a voluntary basis to maintain and improve the facilities in the parish.

This year, with ever increasing costs, it has been necessary for the Parish Council to increase the annual precept (tax raised via the Gedling Borough Council annual rates invoice) up to a total of £19,905. Currently the parish precept is 2.2% of the total Council Tax bill (band D), This increase equates to an additional weekly charge of 52p per household. Last year the Council capped its increase to 0.4%. However, the Parish Council needs to increase the 2022/23 precept to cover its increasing costs, including wages and legal obligations. Some costs are much the same for all parishes, so they are disproportionately greater per property for smaller ones like Papplewick. All costs are carefully scrutinised and we always seek competitive quotes for work and services.

This decision has not been taken lightly, and we wanted to take the opportunity to share with you some information about the things that the precept needs to cover within the annual budget: The Parish Council is responsible for, amongst other things, Church Lane maintenance, QE2 Playing Field maintenance (including mowing, tree management and maintenance of the play equipment), public liability insurance, digital presence and compliance. The costs for all of these items has steadily increased. Unfortunately, although we would like to be able to absorb the increases this has not been possible within our overall budget. Additionally, we seek and obtain grants or donations where possible to make our funds go further.

Your Parish Council meets on the second Wednesday of every alternative month (Jan, Mar, May, July, Sept, Nov) in the Village Hall. Each meeting starts at 7.15pm with an open forum for any parishioners to discuss concerns or issues they may have. All are welcome to join us.


Walking for health: At this time of year we start to think about the mud drying up and getting out to walk in the beautiful English Countryside again, but where to find new and interesting walks?



News from around the Parish

The Queen Elizabeth II playground developments

All equipment on the playing field is owned and maintained by the Parish Council, not Gedling Borough Council. The Council have repaired the damaged safety surface surrounding the roundabout. All other equipment has been refurbished





You may have noticed that in recent months the wheeled activity equipment on the playing field has been out of action. This followed an annual insurance inspection which identified a number of significant repairs necessary. The Council is currently working with local volunteers to agree a design for a replacement wheeled activity area. We are hoping to apply for grant funding to cover some of the cost of this work. Planning applications

made within the Parish, typically there are two or more cases each month. These relate to various works ranging from managing trees to major infrastructure projects. Most involve modifications or additions to buildings.

The final decision on all applications is made either by Gedling's planning department on minor matters, or the Borough Council planning committee. Not all applications are approved, and sometimes consent is given, but with conditions. A planning rejection is disappointing and can be costly for the applicant.

Papplewick has a Neighbourhood plan, developed with community engagement, Gedling have their published planning policy, which has a section about development within the Green belt (in which this parish sits). If you are thinking of submitting a planning application we would encourage you, or your advisers to align the application with these documents to increase the chances of a successful application.

Flooding

Keeping watercourses clear and maintained is important to manage surface water, prevent flooding and improve habitats for wildlife. Streams, rivers,

brooks, culverts and roadside ditches are all watercourses, but did you know that if you have any of these running through underneath or next to your property, it is your responsibility to look after them? This is called Riparian Ownership.

The County Council has just published a useful leaflet explaining what this is about.

Moor Pond Woods Project

Nestboxes: In 2021 the group installed more than 60 nest boxes in the woods, doubling the previous number. In addition 33 bat-boxes were erected. These were all sponsored by the Co-op Community Fund, and we are very grateful for their support. When we checked them in the autumn, more than half had successful nests last year.



Path works: The group was awarded a Local Improvement Scheme Grant by the County Council, to pay for upgrading the paths around Papplewick Dam Wood, to the benefit of all users, but particularly those with pushchairs or limited mobility. The next phase is to relay the paths near the fishing pond. We have already replaced the footbridge over the river. Some work has also been carried out near the waterfall, to limit erosion.

Volunteering: The Covid-19 lockdowns emphasised the value of the project area as a green space for recreation. The Friends group has got a backlog of maintenance, because of the limitations of meeting in groups. Would you have some time to help by volunteering? We are about to organise a new timetable of dates starting in March.
